STUDENTS IN TRANSITION UPDATE

The Students in Transition ministry is now operating in most of our county schools. We really appreciate all the churches that are helping with this.

We still have a couple of schools where plans are not complete, but we hope that will happen before the end of this school year.

The biggest effort has turned out to be in the elementary schools with children having day to day needs for emergency clothing and a few toiletries. Following is a list of items we need:



- New underwear in all sizes (children 4T and up). This will be the most continual need. Churches who are paired with schools may want to keep the items at their church for quick access.
- **Gently used clothing, especially in smaller sizes** (size 4T through 14) Active wear and sweat pants work best as they will accommodate more sizes. The need is greater for boys' clothing, too. Again, if you are working with a school, you may want to keep a tub stocked at your church to be ready.
- **Toiletry items** such as toothbrushes, toothpaste, deodorant, hair brushes, soap, and washcloths are needed.
- Belts have been requested by the high schools. These are for boy's and men's sizes.
- We can use a few boxes of **sandwich bags** (for bagging the socks and underwear individually.
- **Socks** in smaller sizes, especially for boys, can be used.

The list of items may change as more schools are added. We will keep you posted and update the list as needed.

Donated items can be left in the deck box by the back door at the PBA office. Please let Billie Freeman (PBA office) or Gail Swanson (434-724-1120) know if you plan to drop items off so we can move them inside.

Also, please let us know if you are a host church and you need items to replenish your supplies. We can leave the items in the deck box or make arrangements to get them to you. You may also wish to come by the office when Billie is in (M-W) and pick out what you want to restock. Again, thank you so much for your help.

KENTUCKY UPDATE

Following the tragic flooding in portions of Kentucky late last summer, churches in our association stepped up to help in any way they could. Together we provided:

- Two vans full of flood relief supplies (food, cleaning supplies, and paper products).
- A team returned with tools and paneling to help Harvey Bend Baptist after having its building submerged in nearly 8 feet of flood water.
- A van full of winter clothing and blankets to help those in need as the winter temperatures arrived.
- On our fourth trip we delivered the remaining winter clothing items along with a 21 boxes of books donated by Caswell County 4H for a school in Letcher County that lost the contents of its library in the flood.

Through this all, Rev. Bob Thurman and State Line Baptist has been instrumental in helping with the teams and transportations of the supplies. Thank you!

The following was written by Jason Austin, the son-in-law of Rev. Charles and Gail Swanson of Melville Avenue Baptist. Jason joined us on the construction trip and wrote this for Melville's newsletter but it was too good not to share.

Pretty Green Hills

Sound and scenery synchronized as I entered Kentucky on Hwy 23 and listened to the song Pretty Green Hills by Dave Evans on the radio. I was traveling to join other participants with the Pittsylvania Baptist Association on a mission trip to Clayhole, KY. Our goal was to help rebuild a church that was damaged by the summer flooding.

I learned of the trip through my wife Lucinda. She had a conversation with her mother, Gail Swanson, who mentioned the project and that I might be helpful to the group. When Lucinda relayed the message, I immediately thought of Frank Harvey, a member of Melville Avenue Baptist Church. I was inspired by his leadership in volunteering with God's Pit Crew and participating in similar trips.

My first encounter with flood damage came from a wrong turn in Hindman, KY. I ended up on West Main St. where I saw several buildings boarded up and people about with tools in hand. I got reoriented eventually finding my way to SR 476. I crossed over the ominously named Troublesome Creek, and the toll of the flood became more apparent. There was scattered debris, bridges washed away, and a damaged elementary school; however, it wasn't until I turned the curve just past the school that I understood the magnitude of the flood.

As I drove the car, I could see Troublesome Creek about 30 to 40 feet down a steep bank below the road. After studying the creek for a few moments, my attention was drawn to plastic bags, vines, and other items entangled on a power line that was approximately 10 to 15 feet above the car. That equates to an approximate average of 47.5 feet. This was unlike any flood that I've witnessed, and the damage got worse—collapsed structures, homes removed from foundations, cars upended; destruction was ubiquitous, but so, too, was the presence of the pretty green hills.

After the somber journey on SR 476, I arrived at Bethel

Mennonite Camp late Thursday afternoon. This was the location where I met up with the other PBA volunteers. Camp leaders graciously opened the camp to house volunteers and to be a distribution center for flood relief supplies. In fact, if you donated supplies to the PBA flood relief drive, Bethel Mennonite Camp is where they were brought.

Our work at Harvey Bend Church began the next day. Two men ran errands for various supplies. Two worked to build picnic tables. The ladies helped clean a refrigerator. I worked with another PBA volunteer and the pastor of the church to hang wall paneling. As smaller tasks were completed, efforts were focused on the paneling. By the time our group departed for home Saturday around 1 p.m., we had finished the walls of the sanctuary.

This building withstood the fury of the hollow, but inside of the block walls was ruin. With every reason to permanently close the doors, Harvey Bend Church is pushing to reopen. People can be like the building; outwardly appearing to withstand the brute force of life in the valley only for there to be ruin and brokenness inside. To those suffering quietly, seeking a relationship with Jesus helps to reframe and manage the brokenness. As the Apostle Paul writes, "I press on toward the goal to win the prize for which God has called me heavenward in Christ Jesus" (Philippians 3:14 NIV).

Will Harvey Bend Church succeed? If so, how many members will return? There are many hours of hard work and uncertainty that remain. What is known, however, is that one small group of people assembled to complete a few small jobs to help this church step forward in the name of Jesus. In doing so, God's people boldly declared that together we shall serve in this place, for it is in this place that He allows us to serve. And from this broken place, we shall one day be called home—ushered by His mighty hand from the torrent of the valley to the sun-filled tops of those pretty green hills. -Jason Austin
